The first Northern Ontario Badminton Association Championships were held in Sault Ste Marie on April 22-23, 1927. Organized by Captain W.R. Griffiths, a newcomer to the area, the event was supported by over 100 players from five clubs in Sault Ste Marie and was pronounced a great success.

Badminton was emerging as a popular sport in Canada during the early 20s, but the drive to organization and promotion of the game in the north was provided by Mr & Mrs Reg Griffiths. They moved to Sault Ste Marie in 1925 from Toronto, where they had played badminton at the Carlton Club. They were both fine players.

Through the leadership of Mr Griffiths, the Northern Ontario Badminton Association was formed, a loose federation of several clubs in Sault Ste Marie of which no records remain. The first association championships were held on April 22-23, 1927. Excerpts from the account in the Sault Daily Star tell the story and give a feeling of the times:

"Brilliant play in the majority of events marked the finals of the championship and consolation events with which play in the first Northern Ontario badminton championships closed on the Duchess courts here on Saturday. The tournament, in which representatives from all five clubs in the Sault played, and which included one hundred entries, reached a climax with the finals on Saturday afternoon and evening, and was one of the most successful first-year tournaments that has ever been run in the history of Sault sportdom.

"The winning of the feature events of the tournament, the men's and ladies' singles, was marked by the play of Mr and Mrs W.R. Griffiths who introduced the game here from Toronto some two years ago with play at the St Luke's Parish Hall, where courts were put in and a club formed. Both were given keen games by the runners-up, Mrs A.H. Woods and H.F. Rowland, and only superior style enabled them to take out wins.

"The most brilliant game of the tournament marked the play of the first game on Saturday evening, when Mrs A.H. Woods and Harold Tolley won from Mr and Mrs W.R. Griffiths 5-4,4-15,15-11. The match was replete with sensational rallies, effective smashing drives and short

court work that spoke of the master touch."

Other winners of that very first Northern were Sally Woods and Rita Taylor in women's doubles, and Hart Buck in men's doubles Harold Tolley and Hart Buck in men's doubles.

The following year, 1928, saw some new faces on the scene. Sally Woods and Rita Taylor were the only title-holders to retain their crowns and Jean Rossiter and Bill Wolters became the new singles champions.

"The 3rd annual Northern Ontario Badminton Tournament (under the auspices of the NOBA) will be held on April 24,25,26,27, 1929 on the court at St Luke's Hall, Sault Ste Marie, Ontario."

This announcement headed the printed invitation card sent out by the tournament committee. The card also informed that the honorary president was George R. Gray and that the executive committee was composed of Reg Griffiths (chairman), Clayton Barber, Tom Chitty and Harry Rowland. Honorary secretary-treasurer was Harold Tolley.

The announcement indicated that entry fees would be 50 cents per event. It was to be a historic tournament, owing to the emergence of The Northern's first superstar: Joe Zaharko.

The feature article in the local Sault Daily Star, written by J. Fraser MacDougall, began:

"Holder of the men's singles badminton championship of Northern Ontario and never owned a racquet. Such is the almost unbelievable achievement of a sixteen-year-old youth who this year carried off the singles crown."

Joe had begun playing badminton four months earlier, under the guidance of Rev I.G. Perkins and Clayton Barber at the All Peoples' United Church Mission. During games in the city league that winter, he had notched some fine wins, notably over Harold Tolley, one of the Sault's top players. Since he owned no racquet of his own, he borrowed racquets from different players during competition, never using the same one twice throughout.

When the first Northerns were held in Sault Ste Marie, participants received a small printed program that listed past winners and tournament details. These examples have survived among the souvenirs of Verna Lacy, now of New Liskeard. Formerly Verna Robinson, she began her playing career in Sault Ste Marie, moving to Timmins after her marriage. She won 9 Northern titles, from 1934 to 1951!

At the 1929 Northern, he was a sensation, working his way through four rounds of upsets to win the singles crown. On May 9 of that year, at the season-closing social evening for the All People's United Church badminton club, Joe was presented with a racquet.

At the 1930 Northern, Joe teamed up with Jim Wilson, a short active man old enough to be his father. He was a war veteran who played with a silver plate in his leg, the result of wounds sustained during the Great War. His mixed partner was Vi Rahilly. The combinations were unbeatable and Joe won his first Northern triple crown. He was 17 years old and "earned for himself the highest regard of the whole sporting world of the Sault for his great ability and his fighting heart."

In 1931, Joe again won the singles and the mixed - this time with Anne Carter - but he and Jim Wilson finished as runners-up in the doubles. Joe had been seriously ill at the start of the season, bed-ridden for six weeks, and it was felt that he never reached peak form during the tournament

During the next few years, Joe Zaharko perfected his game to the point where he was recognized as the number two player in Canada. He often played Jack Purcell, who was number one, and reached a point where he won as many as he lost to Purcell. During the 1929-30 season, Joe first played against Jack Purcell in both Sault Ste Marie and Blind River, when Purcell was on a tour of the north.

In 1936 and 1937, he won New England tournaments, including one year when he defeated the English champion Ken Davidson and the American champion Walter Kramer. In 1939, he led Purcell 14-11 in the third set at the World Professional championships in Atlanta, before losing.

In 1932, Joe moved from Sault Ste Marie to Toronto to work at Slazenger's Sporting Goods, then entered the USA to attend the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. He did, however, return to the Sault for the 1932 and 1933 Northerners, winning triple crowns at both. He had played in only 5 Northerns, but won 12 out of a possible total of 15 titles. In 1937, he won the Canadian national men's doubles championship in Vancouver, partnered by Jack Sibbald.

After graduation, Joe joined Dupont and moved to Wilmington, Delaware (25 miles south of Philadelphia and home town of the 1980 Canadian champion, Pat Tryon) where he has lived ever since. He worked in research with Dupont for 30 years before retiring in 1976, one of his most noteworthy accomplishments being the invention of nylon tennis strings in 1937. More recently, he has developed a new tennis court surface called "Supreme Court" that is being used for top professional play, including the Masters Grand Prix in New York in January, 1981.

Joe hasn't played any badminton in 15-20 years, though he keeps very fit and plays squash and tennis every day. He found badminton was too strenuous, and too hard on the knees. He offers these comments on the game:

"The key to good badminton is anticipation. You have to get the step on your opponent. Quickness and coordination are also important, but not as much as anticipation."

winners' circle, besides Joe Zaharko, Jim Wilson and Reg Griffiths, was Dr. John McDonald, also a very strong player of the time.

In 1934, two more great Northern stars won their first Northern titles. Bill Plewman won the first of three singles victories, to which he would later add five doubles wins. He has the distinction of being the second of only eight men to win Northern triples (1938) and also holds the record for the longest period of time between championships. His first title was earned in 1934 and his last in 1955, 21 years later, when he won the doubles with Gord Frech.

ranks that year was Verna Robinson Lacy. She won the mixed doubles with Bill Hughes, and later added 8 more Northern titles to her credit. Interestingly enough, Verna holds the record for the longest period of time for a woman between championships, and is second overall only to Bill Plewman. Her first title in 1934 and her last one in 1951 spanned a period of 17 years.

In the 1934 Northern, Bill Hughes was a double winner, teaming up with Art Denning to capture the men's doubles event.

In 1935, Northern No. 9, Bill Hughes retained his doubles crown, this time with Jim Wilson, and Anne Carter and Jean Rossiter won the women's doubles for the third successive time. (It was the 7th consecutive year in which at least one of them had figured in the championship team!) The other titles changed hands, though, as Harold Crowder won the first of his three Northern titles by defeating Harold Tolley in the final. The Sault Daily Star reported:

"Crowder won in straight games but both were bitterly contested and produced brilliant badminton, particularly in the later stages of the nip and tuck second struggle, before Tolley bowed out by scores of 15-11 and 17-16."

Double winner that year was Jim Wilson who partnered Helen Best to take the mixed doubles. It was the first of five Northern titles for Helen and the team successfully defended the mixed the following year for Wilson to earn his 6th and final Northern doubles crown.

Also repeating as title holder in 1936 was Harold Crowder, who not only defended his singles crown but also won the men's doubles with George Wilson. The latter match was described by the Sault Daily Star as "a somewhat astonishing feat in setting down the veteran team of Jim Wilson and Charles Wales. The winners took the first set after a struggle 15-12, lost the second set 11-15, and then came back to wind up the third going all out 15-5. The large gallery sat silent as the feature battle of the tournament progressed."

Harold Crowder played in most, if not all, of the Northerns from the very beginning and is still active, in his mid-70s, in the Soo Badminton Club. He certainly qualifies as the Grand Master of The Northern, and we look forward to seeing him on the courts at the special tournament being held in conjunction with the 50th celebrations.

In 1936, Anne Carter won her 5th Northern women's doubles crown, this time with Winn Fisher Myers.

In 1937, there were a record 150 players in The Northern. Bill Plewman won the singles, Helen Best and Lorette Levie won the womens doubles, and Jeff Hall and Anne Carter won the mixed doubles. The men's doubles was noteworthy in that it was the first Northern title ever won by other than Sault Ste Marie players: Bob Kline and Gordon Malcolm of the Michigan Sault.

1938 saw Bill Plewman achieve the coveted triple crown, only the second player in The Northern to do so h also saw Anne Carter extend her extraordinary record: she won her 6th mixed doubles title - a record that stands to this day - and her 6th women's doubles title. The latter tied the record set by Jean Rossiter in 1935, a feat that also is unmatched as of this date.

Sault Club players "in token of their appreciation for her untiring efforts in the interests of the club and more particularly her help to the younger members of the club." She was known for her aggressive style of play, at a time when lobs and net shots were more commonly the order of the day.

That 1938 tournament was significant in many respects as it marked the end of the first phase of The Northern's development. The first 12 Northerns were all held in Sault Ste Marie, consisting only of players from Sault Ste Marie and, occasionally, the Michigan Sault. The following year saw an expansion to Sudbury, then Timmins, and an influx of new players to swell The Northern's ranks.

At the end of the 1938 Northern, a prize called the Tom Chitty Cup was presented to Gordon Frech for being the junior singles champion of Sault Ste Marie. He and his partner Bob Webber had pulled off major upsets to earn a place in the men's doubles final at The Northern, but it was a place that would become very familiar to Gord Frech later as he won 10 Northern championships between 1950 and 1959.

Focus for badminton activity in Sault Ste Marie during the 30s was the Sault Club, later called the Algo Club. It was built and maintained by the Algoma Steel Corporation, but when it was torn down and replaced in later years, no badminton courts were included in the new facility.

A far-reaching and well-balanced badminton program flourished. There were city championships, inter-club league play on a regular basis, development of junior players, and lots of social activity. Out of all this came the outstanding players and dedicated administrators who gave The Northern its great start.

According to the program issued at the 1952 Northern, players in Sudbury thought they were holding the first northern Ontario championship when they hosted what was, in fact, the 13th Northern in 1939. The program read:

"The origin of the Northern Ontario Badminton Association dates back to the latter part of 1938. Because of zealous enthusiasm on the part of several of Sudbury's players and sparked by George Von Zuban popular tennis, badminton and curling exponent, clubs throughout Northern Ontario were contacted and arrangements were made to stage the first tourney in Sudbury the following March. R.E. "Bim" Sturgeon was elected President and George Von Zuban and Carl Schaeffer headed the first Tournament Committee."

Whether there was any liaison between the Sault Ste Marie and Sudbury groups, we have no way of knowing. However, in retrospect, it seems unlikely that there was not; probably the records had been lost between 1939 and 1952.

The plan was for the tournament to alternate among Sudbury, Timmins and Sault Ste Marie and the arrangement worked quite well through three or four rotations.

All we know of the 1939 Northern are the names of the champions. R. Simms of Copper Cliff won the men's singles and Ann Grady of Schumacher was a winner in both women's and mixed doubles. Neither name appears in any future Northerns. The other titles were won by four players who were to be dominant forces throughout the 40s: Doris Sturgeon of Schumacher in women's singles and doubles; Ovide Gauthier and George Von Zuban of Sudbury in men's doubles; and Gordon Shields of Schumacher in mixed doubles.

Throughout its history, The Northern has been held in Timmins only four times and the first of those was in 1940. To be precise, it was held in Schumacher on the courts of the Porcupine Badminton Club, in the days before municipal amalgamation included the towns of Schumacher, South Porcupine and Porcupine within the boundaries of the city of Timmins. The three small mining communities

had a reputation for producing outstanding athletes and it certainly held true for badminton.

The results of the tournament were a landslide for the home club with Gordon Shields winning a triple crown and Verna Lacy (formerly Verna Robinson of Sault Ste Marie) winning the women's events. Their partners were Doris Sturgeon, Bim Sturgeon and Betty Shields

This is the first year in which we have any record of The Northern's first challenge trophies, and the photograph shows that there was a good assortment of more practical prizes as well.

At a meeting held following the tournament, the election of NOBA officers was held. Bill Plewman of Sault Ste Marie became president, Bim Sturgeon of Schumacher vice president, and Gordon Browning from Sault Ste Marie was installed as secretary-treasurer.

In 1941, The Northern returned to Sault Ste Marie and the honors were shared among players from all three NOBA cities. Helen Best of Sault Ste Marie won the women's singles and, with Mrs J Adams, the doubles. Gordon Shields and Bim Sturgeon of Schumacher retained their titles in men's singles and doubles, and Ovide Gauthier and Kitty Young of Sudbury won the mixed.

In 1942, Northern No. 16 was played in Sudbury

and local star Ovide Gauthier captured the first of his two Northern triples, partnered by George Von Zuban and Margaret Wilson. The Schumacher women continued to dominate with Doris Sturgeon winning the singles and teaming with Verna Lacy to take the doubles.

All we know of the five-year period from 1943 to 1947 is a further reference in the earlier-mentioned program of the 1952 Northern. It simply states that during those years "championship play was suspended owing to the war years and the post-war readjust-ments."

When play resumed, it was again in Timmins. Players travelled by plane from Sudbury, an event that was considered newsworthy as seen by the accompanying photo. More northern Ontario clubs came to The Northern for the first time in



The 1949 Northern was played at the Inco Employees Club in Sudbury and received excellent publicity in the Sudbury Daily Star. The newspaper account of the finals tells the story in the style of the day:

"Big Ovide Gauthier stole the spotlight at Sunday's concluding day of play in the Northern Ontario Badminton Association championships as he annexed three crowns, duplicating the triple-winning act he staged when the championships were last held in Sudbury in 1942. The starry Ryan Club court performer won the singles title, paired with his brother, Fritz, to take the doubles crown and teamed with Mrs Margaret Wilson of Copper Cliff to capture the mixed doubles. The other two titles went to the Porcupine Badminton Club of Timmins, as Mrs Verna Lacy retained her singles title and teamed with Mrs Jean Scott to win the ladies doubles.

"The 1949 championships were decided before the largest gallery to ever witness a badminton tournament in Sudbury. Brilliant play featured all championship finals at the Inco Club Sunday afternoon and although some of the scores were lopsided, play was much closer and keener than they might indicate. Trophies and prizes were presented to winners and runners-up at the conclusion of play, G.S. Jarrett of Copper Cliff, honorary president of the associa-

tion, making the presentations. "In scoring his triple triumph, Ovide Gauthier again demonstrated that he is still "Mr Badminton" in





In 1950 The Northern was again held in Sault Ste Marie. It marked the end of the Ovide Gauthier era and the start of the Gord Frech era. The two met in the singles final for the second year in a row and the Sudbury Daily Star reported the result this way:

"Frech supplied the upset of the tournament by knocking off the burly Sudbury detective in a marathon men's singles final. The trim Lock City swatter toppled the champion 15-9 in the first game, dropped the middle stanza by the same score, and then rallied to win another 15-9 victory in the saw-off game."

Ovide Gauthier did win the doubles with his brother Fritz, in what was to be their last appearance in a Northern final. Gord and Jean Frech won the mixed and Jean Scott of Timmins won the women's singles. A "ladies trophy" went to Sudbury for the first time in the history of The Northern when Stella Crawford and Edna Johnston defeated Jean Frech and Dolly Edwards in the doubles final.

In 1951, The Northern returned to Timmins and two more great stars of the 40s said their farewells. Doris Sturgeon of Timmins and Verna Lacy, this time playing out of New Liskeard where she still makes her home, won the women's doubles to top their long careers. Among them, Ovide Gauthier, Verna Lacy and Doris Sturgeon collected 27 Northern championship titles even though their playing period crossed the five years in which no Northerns were held. They certainly would have rewritten the record book if circumstances had been different.

As has always been the case in The Northern, new stars were rising as old ones were setting, and the new star in 1951 was undoubtedly Sault Ste Marie's Gord Frech. He won a convincing triple victory, partnered by Bill Plewman and Jean McLeod, and followed up the following year with two more titles for a total of 7 out of a possible 9 championships in three years! He won the singles again in 1953 to set a standard that is surpassed only by Joe Zaharko and Ed Hreljac, and topped off his career with another doubles title in 1956.

Nan Stronach of Schumacher won the women's singles in 1951, in what appears to be her only Northern appearance.

The 1952 Northern was held at the Inco Club in Sudbury and a very nice tournament program was produced. It listed John Saganiewicz (Hartman) as the NOBA president, Bim Sturgeon as past president, Gord Frech as vice-president and Collette Potvin as secretarytreasurer. George Jarrett of Copper Cliff was once again honorary president.

The tournament committee comprised 16 people to organize play, 12 people on the social committee, 3 on the publicity committee, and 4 to take registrations. Badminton was starting to boom in Sudbury, with a Nickel Belt Association that held regular inter-club play and other events. It would soon start to show up in The Northern's results!

Sudbury captured three of the Northern titles in 1952 as Mary Terrell won the women's singles, Edna Johnston and Stella Crawford won the women's doubles, and Gerry Myers and Harvey Nadeau won the men's doubles. They could not yet, however, stop Gord Frech of Sault Ste Marie, who retained his titles in both singles and mixed.

In 1953, The Northern returned to the Algo Club in Sault Ste Marie and the Sault Ste Marie-Sudbury rivalry continued. A feature of the tournament was the first Northern appearance of Helen Forbes, a young physical education teacher who had just moved to Sault Ste Marie and would become the dominant woman in The Northern during the 50s. She got off to a great start by winning the singles and, with Bill Plewman, the mixed.

Gord Frech won his fourth successive singles title, as mentioned earlier, but the other two events went to

Sudbury. Sheila Keegan and Collette Potvin won the women's doubles while John Hartman and Gino Gonnella won the men's doubles. For all four, it was their first Northern title.

Gino Gonnella, from Creighton Mine near Sudbury, also earned honorable mention in the Sault Star

for his singles play: "The men's singles saw two dazzling exhibitions. Sudbury's Gino Gonnella knocked off A. Robertson of the Sudbury's Bub Jewitt edged Terry Corbett of the Sault and in nip-'n-tuck affairs that proved crowd-pleasers of the best kind."

1954 saw The Northern broadening its horizons once again by finding a new home at the Noranda Recreation Center in Noranda, Quebec. With both north-Recreation Ontario and northwestern Quebec effectively isolated from the mainstream of activity in the southern parts of their provinces, this marked the beginning of a long association that would be of mutual benefit to clubs in both areas. The border between the provinces seemed less significant than the invisible border separating north from south.

Most of the strong competition came from Sudbury, but Helen Forbes made the 400-mile trek from Sault Ste Marie to successfully defend her women's singles title. The new men's singles champion was Gerry Myers of Sudbury and his win was reported in the Sudbury Daily

Star: "A surprised Gerry Myers defeated Gino Gonnella of Creighton Mine in a comeback win after dropping the first game of the match. Myers smashed back to take the set 6-15,15-6,15-3.







The year 1955 will be remembered always as the year that Ed Hreljac arrived at The Northern, the player who was to become the most dominant in its history to this date. Between 1955 and 1971, Ed Hreljac won 12 men's singles crowns, a record that comes into perspective when you realize the the next highest totals ever achieved were by Joe Zaharko with 5 and Gord Frech with 4. He added to this, 9 men's doubles titles, second only to the record of his partner Gino Gonnella who won 11; together they formed the most successful team in the history of The Northern. Occasionally, Ed also dabbled in mixed doubles, winning 4 titles in the event - enough to earn him triple crowns in both 1958 and 1964. Other great Northern champions amassed 11,12 or 13 titles during their careers; Ed Hreljac won an awesome 25.

words, "our kids took an awful beating and I decided then there that they could not do that to our northern juniors."

It occurred to Ev that badminton words.

It occurred to Ev that badminton would be a fine game to get going among the teenagers at the Creighton game Employees Club, Creighton Mine being a community Mine Employees Club, Creighton Mine being a community of 1,000 people a few miles outside the city of Sudbury. Ouring the next few months Ev kept returning to Toronto During the next few months Ev kept returning to Toronto on weekends - five times in all - learning how to teach on weekends - five times in all - learning how to teach badminton. All-time greats like Jack Purcell and Don badminton. All-time greats like Jack Purcell and Don Smythe liked his interest and enthusiasm, and gave him lots of help and encouragement. The Creighton Mine Junior Badminton Club was born.

What happened next is recounted in an "Inco Triangle" feature article in 1958:

"Ev got his teenagers started at the game the next fall, 1952. In his first class was a little kid, four or five years younger than most of the others, but already on fire with an intense ambition to be the best. That was Eddie Hreljac.

"Within a year he was a semi-finalist in the Ontario junior B (under 16) singles at Stratford. The following year he won it. Before he had played three years he became the first triple champion in Ontario junior badminton. He repeated his triple smash in 1956, won two out of three in 1957, won all three again in 1958. Out of 12 possible Ontario junior A (under 19) championships, he won 11. And it was a clubmate of his, Allan Massey, who took care of the 12th.

"Eddie went to Baltimore in 1956 and won the eastern United States open junior title. That same year he played for Canada against the USA in the international matches and won three of his country's six points. He was blazing.

"Although he broke an ankle playing football at Copper Cliff High School in the fall of 1957, Eddie was back knocking at the door of the big trophy room this year. Despite trouble from the ankle he seared his way through to the Canadian junior finals, then won the Molson's trophy as Canadian junior singles champion with a brilliant demonstation of skill and speed in Victoria, British Columbia on March 5, 1958.

"The Creighton teenagers are the enfants terrible of the Ontario junior badminton world. Of the 36 people in the final matches last year at the Granite Club in Toronto, 23 were from Creighton Mine. That's saturation.

"Eddie and his pals have worked this thing up by themselves, with the devoted help of fellows like Harry Narasnek and Keith MacNaughton, and many others who dug down to assist with the finances.

"They couldn't practise under championship conditions, and they had no pros to polish up their playing. But they had spirit, and they had Ev Staples.

"One of them became a Dominion champion.
"It's really quite a story, isn't it?"

In 1952, Ev Staples had seemingly "overnight" turned himself into one of the most effective badminton coaches in Canada. Drawing from a small population, playing in a facility that had slippery floors and inefficient lighting, and training with plastic birds when all the competitions were played with feather birds, he proved that the coach can be the deciding factor. Without doubt, Ed Hreljac was an extraordinary athlete and it was an almost "star crossed" circumstance that put he and Ev Staples in the same place at the same time. But there were many more young Creighton Mine players who were headliners in their own right, and as a result The Northern would never be the

Sudbury Don Mackintosh, sports editor of the Sudbury Star, reported on the finals:

Star, reported on the final of the best competition on record highlighted this year's Northern Ontario badminton championship tourney, which wound up at the Inco Employees Club courts yesterday.

"But the 1955 edition of this annual event will be better remembered as the year a 15-year-old kid named Eddie Hreljac trimmed some of the best men's singles players in the district.

"The Ontario junior champion and Dominion finalist from Creighton Mine never lost a game in blasting six opponents on his way to the title.

"The list of victims included defending champion Gerry Myers and seeded players Harvey Nadeau and Johnny Hartman.

"Hartman, who reached the finals in three events, never had a chance in yesterday's singles event. Hreljac ran through him 15-1 in the first game. He had his man down 12-0 before a wood fault permitted Hartman to score.

"In the second game Hartman got off on the right foot to lead 6-1. Then the serve came back to Hreljac and foot to lead off 10 straight points. It finished 15-8.
"He's terrific," was Hartman's

after the pummelling was over." Mackintosh later added: "And beaming like a kid at a circus from the sidelines was veteran Ev Staples. No at a chief Ev remembered less than three years ago when doubt L. Jears ago when 12-year-old Eddie walked into the club at Creighton and asked how to hold a racquet."

In the other events, Jean McCrea of Sudbury was a popular winner as she upset title-holder Helen Forbes of Sault Ste Marie. The victory for Jean denied Helen her triple Sault steem ner triple crown as she went on to win the women's doubles with Jean McLeod and the mixed doubles with Bill Plewman.

John Hartman was runner-up in singles and mixed, but he and Gino Gonnella repeated their 1953 victory in doubles.

In 1956, The Northern had its silver anniversary, though nobody knew it at the time. The tournament was held, appropriately enough, in Sault Ste Marie and a Creighton Mine bid to sweep all the events was stopped by only the narrowest of margins. In the mixed doubles final. the last of the day, Gord Frech and Jean McLeod defeated Ed Hreljac and Marie Barbe by the scores of 15-12,15-17, 15-9.

Of the 1966-67 season, the "Inco Triangle" had this to say:

Long a hotbed of junior badminton, Creighton Employees Club has just had probably the biggest season in its history, winning 19 championships out of a possible 40 in three junior and three senior tournam-

Its seven-player team, coached and managed by Ev Staples, with special instruction in tournament play by the Northern Ontario champ, Ed Hreljac, brought home the bacon from the Kitchener International junior tourney, the Ontario juniors, the Nickel Belt seniors, the Garson open seniors, the Temiskaming open seniors, and the Northern Ontario high school championships."

Ed and Marie were in contention for the first ever double triple in Northern history since both had earlier won the singles and doubles events. Marie's partner was Bev Cassell, also of Creighton Mine, and Ed teamed with Gino Gonnella for the first of their 8 Northern victories together. Ed and Marie's wins were no pushovers, as partner Gino Gonnella extended Ed to the limit before going down 17-15,17-16 and in the doubles events, both matches went to

Altogether they won 50 trophies. There were over 75 boys and girls under 16 taking instruction in the Creighton club's booming badminton group last season, auguring well for future triumphs.

three games with three of the six games going into extra points.

Marie Barbe, now Gonnella, was the brightest' light among the girls in Ev Staples' early Creighton Mine program. She was the Ontario junior singles champion in 1957 and 1958, and reached the Canadian junior finals in both 1956 and 1957.

The 1956 Northern had close to 200 participants and was described as "one of the most successful in the history of the Northern Ontario Badminton Association". Main center of play was the Algo Club, but courts at the Sault Armoury were pressed into service in the early stages to handle the great number of matches.

The 1957 Northern was scheduled for Sudbury, but eventually ended up being played in Orillia as its history took another interesting little twist.

While Ev Staples was travelling the junior tournament circuit, he met the late Cyril Vincent of Gravenhurst, another enthusiastic badminton coach whose daughter Nancy (now Nancy Lynch) was an Ontario junior champion. For about fifteen years, from the mid-fifties to the late-sixties, there was an informal liaison between the Northern Ontario BA and the Georgian Bay District BA that saw Georgian Bay players welcomed in the annual Northern and the tournament actually played in Orillia on two occasions, even though the southern boundary of NOBA is the French River near North Bay.

In 1957, there were just over 100 players in the tournament and they came from Sudbury, Sault Ste Marie, Noranda, Kapuskasing, Owen Sound, Barrie, Huntsville, Midland and Lindsay. Play was on the Garrison Club's home courts in the Orillia Armoury, and at the Ontario Hospital School.

Ed Hreljac won his third singles title and Helen

Both singles champions became double winners by taking the doubles events with their regular partners, Gino Gonnella and Jean McLeod, but the now married team of John and Collette (Potvin) Hartman took the mixed doubles title they had first won in 1954.

In 1958, Helen Forbes battled for her last try at a Northern triple crown, but was foiled again as Ed Hreljac won his first. They both successfully defended their singles

The tournament was played at the Inco Club in Sudbury and there were 101 players from Orillia, Gravenhurst, Timmins, Sudbury, Creighton Mine, Sault Ste Marie, Barrie, Cobalt and Levack.

Ed Hreljac left the courts to go directly to the airport for his flight to Victoria and the Canadian junior championships, which he won as mentioned earlier.

It was the final Northern for left-handed Helen Forbes who had collected no less than 9 Northern titles from the five tournaments in which she participated. Now Helen Swing, she lives in Thunder Bay where she is a reigning NWOBA seniors and masters champion.

Northern No. 28, in 1959, was back on the familiar Algo Club courts in Sault Ste Marie with neither Ed Hreljac or Helen Forbes in attendance.

Marie Barbe won the singles and, with Marion Masih of Sudbury, the doubles, while John Masih and John Hartman won the men's doubles. Gord Frech proved he was still tops in mixed doubles as he won his 10th and final Northern title, the fifth in that event, with Jean McLeod. It was Jean's final Northern also as she ended a career in

which she had collected 7 doubles victories.

The men's singles was interesting in that Creighton Mine players who had been overshadowed by Ed Hreljac and Gino Gonnella were able to step into the spotlight. Tom Stefanko won the championship by defeating Ken Smith; both were from Creighton.

There were many other outstanding players from the Creighton club who had champion stature in their own right, among them Allan Massey, Walter Saftic, Peter Olexiuk (Alexander) and Dan Mitroff. It seemed to outside observers that every one of the Creighton youngsters had a perfect grip, classic overhead strokes and intense concentration in match play. On top of that, their demeanor both on and off court, was beyond reproach. They were super kids with a super coach: Ev Staples.

A total of 110 competitors gathered in Sudbury for the 1960 Northern, and witnessed dramatic wins in both singles events. The tournament report in the Sudbury Star

was written by Paul Rimstead:

"A sprightly young miss and a balding veteran, representing the Orillia Badminton Club, came to Sudbury this weekend and returned home with the Northern Ontario ladies' and men's singles badminton titles.

"The ladies champ is 17-year-old Nancy Vincent of Gravenhurst, still a junior-age competitor, and Jack Moon of Bracebridge who said, "Just say veteran player" when asked his age, is the men's champ.

"Nancy was thrilled with her win. "It's the first singles title I've ever won," she said breathlessly after the match. "I've always seemed to peter out before the finals."

"Nancy downed defending champ Marie Barbe and also eliminated Alice Jamieson, Carol Staples and Lois McNally.

"The singles champs were part of two parentchildren combinations. Jack Moon, a left-handed player incidentally, had his 15-year-old son Doug in the tournament. Nancy teamed with her father, Cyril Vincent former mayor of Gravenhurst, in the mixed doubles."

It was a transition year for Ed Hreljac and for The Northern. Ed was pursuing the serious business of starting a family and a career. He and his wife, Pauline, were expecting the first of their four children and Ed had four more years of training ahead before becoming certified as a chartered accountant. Being about 20 pounds over his former playing weight didn't help his badminton!

The wins by the Hartmans were their last in Northern competition. Stalwarts of the tournament throughout the 50s, John and Collette assured their place in the record book with a total of 12 doubles titles over the years.


1961 saw The Northern played in Orillia for the second and final time, as the Garrison Club were again most gracious hosts.

Nancy Vincent, 18, retained her singles title with a 12-9,12-9 win over Pat Ryan while Jack Moon, 44, successfully defended the men's singles by defeating 18-year-old Peter Olexiuk of Creighton Mine. Peter had been a finalist of the Canadian junior championships in 1960.

Nancy Vincent and Pat Ryan, from Bracebridge, won the women's doubles and John Masih of Sudbury took care of the other two doubles events with partners Walter Saftic and Nellie Smith.

In the consolation round, there were some matches of interest involving players who would figure substantially in The Northern's future. Bev Hassett (Green) of Cobalt and Lois McNally (Urwin) of Sault Ste Marie locked horns in two epic consolation finals, the singles going to Bev 11-6,8-11,11-8 and the doubles going to Lois and Betty Cloutier over Bev and Terry Sullivan 15-9,8-15,15-8.

In 1962, The Northern found a new home once again. Previously played only in Sault Ste Marie, Sudbury, Timmins, Noranda and Orillia, it this time went to the "tri-towns" of New Liskeard, Haileybury and Cobalt. A

total of eight courts spread throughout the three communities were pressed into service, necessitating some fancy footwork on the part of the organizing committee.

The tournament saw the return to dominance of the Creighton Mine players as their sweep of all events, and indeed, of all the positions in the finals, was stopped only by defending women's doubles champions Nancy Vincent and

Pat Ryan.
Newcomer Helen Cavrak won the women's singles while Ed Hreljac won the 5th of his 12 singles crowns. Helen became a double winner, as did Walter Saftic, when she and Walter won the mixed doubles and he and Ed Hreljac took the men's doubles. Helen had been a triple-finalist but she and Carol Staples were defeated by Nancy Vincent and Pat Ryan in the only three-game match of the finals.

With each of the challenge trophies went something a little unusual. All of the winners received trophies of polished highgrade silver, donated by the Langis Mine, worked by Arnold Todd of Cobalt and mounted on stands. No photos are available unfortunately; it would be interesting to see the trophies today, when the price of base metals is so high.

Speaking of high prices, an interesting footnote to the 1962 tournament was that the shuttles cost over \$300! Helen won her second crown of the day when she Marie Gonnella (formerly Marie Barbe and now and now married to Gino Gonnella's brother, Larry) captured the married doubles, but she lost to her partner in straight games in the women's singles final. Helen had won 7 titles out of a possible 9 in three years! Retiring from Northern competition following the 64-65 season, except for a comecompensation and a come-back appearance in 1970, she is now Helen Resetar and lives in Schumacher.

1965: a new page was started in The Northern's story when the tournament was played, for the first of five consecutive years, at the Canadian Forces Base in North Bay. Tournament chairman throughout that period was Jack Illing, a badminton enthusiast stationed at the base, who gave The Northern its only "temporarily permanent" home in all its first 50 years.

There were 89 entries that year, from clubs in Kapuskasing, Noranda, Timmins, North Bay, Deep River. Orillia, Midland, Garson, Gravenhurst and Sudbury.

An interesting blend of new and old players made for a fine tournament. Ed Hreljac met a young newcomer from Capreol who played with Ev Staples' Creighton Mine club, John Gilbert, and was pushed to 17-16 in the second game of their final. John had won the Ontario under 19 mixed doubles championship in 1964. Ed and Gino Gonnella were extended to three games before winning the men's doubles over another Creighton pair, Tom Stefanko and Ken Smith.

Another newcomer, 17-year-old Penny Vincent, came close to a triple win as she defeated her sister in the women's singles final, paired with Nancy to win the women's doubles over defending champions Helen Cavrak and Marie Gonnella, and partnered Bill Dunn of Gravenhurst to the mixed doubles final. They lost that match in three games to a smooth team from Deep River, Chris and Betty Harvey.

This was Nancy Vincent's farewell appearance in The Northern. During the four times she played in it, she

won five titles including two in singles. She married another badminton player, Jim Lynch, and together they formed a most successful doubles team, winning four Ontario championship titles. Nancy is still very much involved in badminton as a Level III coach, a national umpire, and OBA umpiring chairman. She was a runner-up at the Canadian seniors championship last season. Nancy and Jim Lynch live in Gravenhurst.

Northern No. 35, in 1966, saw many familiar faces in the winners' circle. Penny Vincent reached the goal she so nearly attained the previous year by sweeping three events. It was she and Bill Dunn in the mixed doubles, and she and Pat Ryan - a former partner of sister Nancy - in the women's doubles. Ed Hreljac won his 8th Northern singles crown against the same finalist, John Gilbert. This time, John pushed Ed to points in the first game, 18-14.

In men's doubles, Ed Hreljac and Gino Gonnella continued to wreak havoc on the record book by winning

their 7th Northern championship as a team, defeating the colorful Noranda pair of Ray Belanger and Gerry Sigouin.

There were 86 players in the tournament, from clubs in North Bay, Gravenhurst, Orillia, Huntsville, Bracebridge, Creighton Mine, Garson, Sudbury, Noranda, Kapuskasing and Deep River.

This is the first year for which we have any record of the Molson Award. It was a trophy presented annually at The Northern for significant contribution to NOBA. Winner of the award in 1966 was Ev Staples of Creighton

In 1968, Penny Vincent ended her remarkable Northern career. She was a triple-finalist for the 4th consecutive year and won the women's singles for the 4th consecutive time - a record up to that time, and one that has since been matched but never broken. In four years, she won an amazing 9 out of 12 possible titles.

Also a triple-finalist, and Penny's nemesis in the doubles events, was Bev Green of Kapuskasing. Bev won the women's doubles with Jackie Piché in a long three game match and took the mixed doubles with Ed Hreljac.

Ed Hreljac also won the men's singles, but was stopped in his bid for a third triple crown when he and Gino Gonnella lost the men's doubles semi-final to the eventual champions, John Gilbert and Dan Mitroff of Creighton Mine, by scores of 15-12,17-15. John had lost his perennial singles runner-up position when he was beaten by Geniek Ksiazkiewicz, also of Creighton, in another semi-final 15-12,2-15,15-9.

Penny Vincent is now Penny Weissgerber and lives in Geneva, New York where she plays competitive racquetball since there is no badminton there to speak of. She has fond memories of her Northern days:

"I always enjoyed playing in the Northern Ontario tournament. The first one I entered was really fun; I did

nothing distinctive on the courts, but in between games some of the guys taught me how to polka. This was a definite asset during party time at future tournaments. However, I have never found a partner who could come close to holding his own when Gino took the floor!

"I always entered your tournaments anticipating a great deal of pleasure and I was never disappointed. Northern hospitality is terrific; the Northerners seem to be a distinctive breed. They play hard and are very competitive but also mix in a lot of humor and good-natured fun. Here's to many more Northern tournaments!"

Receiving the Molson Award in 1968 was Laurier "Kiki" Arsenault of Noranda. Since the early 50s, Kiki has been a dominant figure on the northern badminton scene first as a player and organizer, and later as a coach. For 25 years, he was the leading male player in the northeastern part of NOBA and received special recognition, along with Bev Green, at the 25th TBA celebrations in New Liskeard in 1977. Turning his attention to coaching, Kiki has developed a program that is one of the most successful in Canada. Denyse Julien, runner-up in mixed doubles at the 1980 Canadian Nationals and a member of the 1981 Uber Cup team, received all her early training in Kiki's program. In addition, many other Rouyn-Noranda junior players have done well at the Quebec provincial level and are always a big threat at northern invitational events.






The 1969 Northern was memorable in many respects. memorando of Kapuskasing Bev the third woman in Northern history to win a triple Normal Jack Illing was honored erowith the Molson Award for outstanding contribution to NOBA as he hosted The Northorn at CFB North Bay for the 5th consecutive year.

But these events were overshadowed by the fact that, once again, Ed Hreljac's bid for a third Northern triple crown was denied him - this time in most spectacular fashion. Wayne Green of the Kapuskasing Northern Times was at the tournament and wrote about what happened:

"The upset of the year came in the men's doubles final when John Gilbert teamed with 11-year-old Lucio Fabris of Creighton Mine to take the measure of Hreljac and Gino Gonnella in a thrilling threegame series. Fabris was projected into the limelight when Gilbert's regular partner, Dan Mitroff, dislocated an elbow just before the start of the tournament. While the youngster played adequately, and the veteran pair didn't help their own cause with some ragged play, it was the work of Gilbert which really made the day. Covering about three-quarters of the court, he came up with countless recoveries which looked to be sure points for the other team.

"It was ironic that the youthful Fabris should steal the spotlight against Hreliac who himself came out of Creighton Mine as a 15-year-old in 1955 and shocked the badminton establishment by capturing the men's singles with ease. He has been almost unbeatable since.

"Both Hreljac and Fabris were developed in the junior badminton program operated by Ev Staples of Creighton Mine."

Yes, the Creighton Mine junior badminton

program was ticking along just like clockwork. About 75 players per year received coaching from Ev Staples and brought home a steady stream of Ontario junior championship titles: Ed Hreljac Jr (nephew of the other Ed Hreljac), Bob Pilon, Ivan MacFarlane, Geniek Ksiazkiewicz, Joanne Mitroff (Hood), Carmen Cozzarini, Kim Mulligan (Sajatovic), Brenda Semeniuk (Coates) were names to be reckoned with, as was the name of Fabris. There were two of them -Linda and Lucio.



1971 was another watershed for The Northern. It was hosted, in Sudbury, by Dan Mitroff and Gino Gonnella and was organized in a much more sophisticated manner than had previously been customary.

The facilities of Laurentian University were made available for the event and a relatively formal dinner and dance were arranged at the President Hotel. Over \$600 in prizes were offered to the winners and the old NOBA challenge trophies were retired, replaced with new ones. An over-40 men's doubles event was offered as a feature event.

Although once again no one knew it at the time, it was The Northern's 40th anniversary and an appropriate time for something special. A lot of pride went into the

preparation for and the presentation of the tournament, since it was a "salute to Badminton" by a group of players to whom the game meant a great deal. Badminton had given them a lot and this was their way of saying thanks and farewell.

Their efforts were not in vain as it is unlikely that any of the 135 players who were there will ever forget the experience. They came from Sudbury, Creighton Mine, Deep River, Elliot Lake, Garson, Kapuskasing, LaSarre, Levack, Lively, Noranda, Sault Ste Marie and Thunder Bay.

Linda Fabris defended her singles, and the mixed doubles with John Gilbert, then teamed with Carmen Cozzarini to win her first triple crown. Ed Hreljac won his final singles title, and John Gilbert and Bob Pilon successfully defended the men's doubles by defeating Ed Hreljac and Ed Hreljac Jr.

For many players who had helped make The Northern what it was during the 50s and 60s, this was their final tournament. Among them was Gino Gonnella, whose record in men's doubles may never be broken. Gino won the event 11 times, including 8 with Ed Hreljac.

The 1972 Northern was again held at Laurentian University in Sudbury, with John Gilbert acting as tournament chairman.

The Creighton Mine sweep of all five events continued for the third successive year: Linda Fabris won the women's singles, Ed Hreljac Jr won the men's singles, Linda Fabris repeated in women's doubles - this time with Vivian Cozzarini, John Gilbert and Bob Pilon won their 3rd consecutive men's doubles title, and John and Linda made it three straight in mixed.

The runner-up positions seem worthy of note. In 1971, Ed Hreljac Jr was a runner-up in three events and avenged himself by winning the singles the following year. In 1972, the unsuccessful finalist in three events was 14-year-old Lucio Fabris.

1973: The Creighton Mine Badminton Club swept all five events at The Northern for an unbelievable four years in a row, and Linda Fabris won her 4th consecutive singles and mixed doubles titles. She and John had never been defeated in The Northern, and she had a perfect record in singles also.

A rapidly maturing Lucio Fabris played in three finals again, this time winning the singles and the doubles. John Gilbert had, the previous year, tied Gino Gonnella's record of five consecutive men's doubles titles and was out to better the mark, but he and Bob Pilon were defeated by Lucio and Ed Hreljac Jr. For the second year in a row, though, John and Linda beat Lucio and Vivian Cozzarini in the mixed doubles final.

John also holds a PhD in English and is a secondary school teacher in Toronto.

1973 was also the last Northern for Ev Staples. He retired from Inco and moved back home to Fredericton, New Brunswick. Retirement soon became semi-retirement as he was pressed into service as technical director and provincial coach, with New Brunswick soon becoming a power to be reckoned with on the national junior scene. Ev has also used his retirement to put his coaching techniques and philosophy in writing. He has produced four outstanding books that are the badminton bible for many coaches and players

Recurrent problems in his knee joints which brought him constant pain while playing and training, combined with his pursuit of a professional career, brought about the decision. Almost lost in the excitement about Lucio at the 1974 Northern, was the fact that yet another Creighton sweep of all events was stopped by Bev Green of

Kapuskasing who defeated Lillian Cozzarini by a score of 11-9 in the third game of their title match. It was Bev's 6th Northern title.

The name Cozzarini had been cropping up consistently among The Northern's finalists since 1969, with older sisters Carmen and Vivian becoming Northern champions in 1971, 1972 and 1973. In 1974, their twin brother and sister, Elio and Lillian, joined them, both being triple-finalists in the tournament.


In 1974 and 1975, Elio Cozzarini joined Lucio Fabris along with Kevin Sherbanuk, Don Cormier and Nevio Cristante to win the Canadian boys team championship, and in 1976 the Creighton trio of Lucio, Elio and Lillian figured as winners in all five events at the Ontario U19 championships. In 1976, Lillian became both an Ontario and a Canadian champion as she and Lucio Fabris were the best mixed doubles team in the country that year. In 1970, when Lucio and Elio (they're cousins) were still in the under 14 category, they played against the top U.S. junior players at a tournament in Niagara Falls. In singles, Lucio defeated Pat Tryon (1980 Canadian singles champion) and Lucio and Elio won the doubles. Of that tournament, Ev Staples said:

"Not taking anything away from Fabris, who played well, Cozzarini was outstanding in beating the top U.S. doubles. It was really his playing which won them the first five matches so easily."

The Cozzarinis had been supporters of the Creighton Mine Junior Badminton Club for a long time, so when Ev Staples left in 1973, Eminio Cozzarini undertook the job of keeping the club together. For several years, he looked after fund-raising, transportation and all the other management details that are necessary for a junior club but, unfortunately, all his efforts to find a coach for the young-sters were fruitless.



In 1975, The Northern returned to Sault Ste Marie. It was the first time the tournament had ever been Marie. It was high school, as the fine facilities of Korah Colleheld in a made available for the occasion, giate were made available for the occasion,

The communities of Garson and Elliot Lake saw Northern titles come their way for the first time that year as Northern faces filled the winners' circle,

Triple winner in the tournament was Plerrette (Côté) Hebner of Garson, who teamed with Brenda (Côté) Is of Creighton Mine in the women's doubles and Semental Bud Hebner in the mixed. Bud was a double and husband he partnered singles champles. husband husband sharper as he partnered singles champion Steve Chen of Elliot Lake to win the men's doubles.

Pierrette and Bud were products of the junior badminton program run in Garson by René Paquette. René had become interested in junior development and coaching had become the single-court community hall of the town of Cobalt during the 50s. When he moved to Garson near Sudbury, he found a community center for Inco employees similar to the ones in Sudbury and Creighton Mine, and here he established a junior club with which he would spend the best part of his spare time for the next 20 years. Brightest star of René's early years in Garson was Judy Morin, who was a double winner at the Ontario junior championships in 1964, 1965 and 1967. Bud and Pierrette learned their badminton in René's program also, and the greatest of them all - Alanna Larocque - would make her debut the following

Steve Chen had just recently moved to Elliot Lake (from Jamaica, via California and Toronto) and won the first two of the five Northern titles he would earn during his three years in the north. His crisp, aggressive style of play did much to stimulate development of badminton here. particularly in the Elliot Lake-Sault Ste Marie area.

Another significant development in 1975 was the election, at the annual meeting held during The Northern.

of the most aggressive president NOBA had ever had. Bey Green of Kapuskasing took over the reins and helped steer the district in new directions for the next two years.


Prior to 1975, the Ontario Badminton Association had meant little to NOBA other than the annual Ontario championship tournaments in which a few of the top players participated. During the early 70s, though, government funding came to amateur sport in Ontario and the provincial organization started looking for ways in which it could be of service at the regional level.

When Bev Green began her term as president, NOBA was in another in-between phase. There were no longer any overpowering players competing in the district, nor a strong club that could provide a focal point. However, there was lots of badminton activity in every city and town in the district and invitational tournaments were becoming more popular all the time.

Diagnosing that the number one priority should be "communication" to tie all this together, Bev conceived the idea of The Northern Shuttle, a monthly newsletter for northerners. Bev Green, Sally Barrette and Rosemary Moore provided the manpower while OBA supplied the financial backing, and the project got off to a successful start in June, 1975.

Another off-shoot of government funding was a re-drawing of the traditional district boundaries in the north. Although The Northern had always focused only on the northeast, theoretically all of northwestern Ontario was included in NOBA as well. It quickly became apparent that 1,000 miles was too great a distance across a district to be at all practical and in May, 1975 the OBA annual meeting approved the creation of a new district - the North Western Ontario Badminton Association - and the present boundaries were drawn. NOBA comprises the Ontario districts of Cochrane, Timiskaming, Nipissing, Sudbury, Algoma and Manitoulin.

With a regular method of communication in place, it seemed that anything was possible. Two new district championship tournaments - the NOBA Junior and the NOBA Seniors - were started; Alan Baird and Bud Hebner conducted a whistle-stop CBA tour giving clinics all



the way; player clinics were conducted by other coaches in many clubs; OBA umpiring and coaching clinics were held; a team trophy was introduced for The Northern; plans were made for a two-week summer camp for NOBA junior players; and a bid was successfully made to host the OBA junior summer camp - coached by England's Ray Stevens - at Laurentian University in Sudbury. There was a strong feeling of excitement as players gathered from clubs throughout the district for the 45th Northern in Timmins in 1976.


Play was held at Northern College and at Roland Michener SS. Steve Chen of Elliot Lake repeated his singles win of the previous year but was stopped in his bid for a second doubles title by the team of Cesar Battochio and Richard Chartrand of Sudbury. They were having a tremendous season and were part of a strong group in Sudbury playing in a program organized at Cambrian College by Terry Kilbride.

Cesar made it two championships on the day by winning the mixed doubles with Brenda Semeniuk of Creighton Mine. It was Brenda's second win also as she had earlier teamed with Alanna Larocque of Garson to take the women's doubles. Alanna was the runner-up in singles, as tournament chairman Bev Green chalked up her 7th Northern crown.

At 14 years of age, Alanna Larocque was the youngest woman ever to win a Northern title; The Northern had its next superstar.

In February, 1976 the Ontario Winter Games were held in Sault Ste Marie. NOBA's team came 4th; team members were Kevin Sherbanuk, Steve Chen, Alanna Larocque, Rika Hartley, Dan Udeschini, Cesar Battochio, Joanne McKinnon and Brenda Semeniuk.

The 76-77 season got off to an early start with the hosting of an international event in May by a committee led

by Terry Kilbride in Sudbury. Laurentian University was the site of the first of seven junior men's singles and doubles exhibitions between Canada and Sweden. The Swedish players were: Ola Eriksson, Christian Lundburg, Stefan Karlsson, Bruno Wackfelt, Willy Nilsson, Claes Nordin and Lars Lundgren. The Canadians were: Ross Clarke, Ken Little, Denys Martin, James Muir, Tom Muir, Ken Priestman and local favorite Lucio Fabris of Creighton Mine,

During the rest of the season, the programs begun the previous year were continued and improved and things seemed to be progressing very well. A logo for NOBA was designed by Barry Hope of Sault Ste Marie, the New Liskeard Badminton Club hosted a gala 25th anniversary TBA tournament, the Ontario "A" championships were held in Sault Ste Marie, and The Northern Shuttle although still hand typed - switched to a tabloid newspaper format after 20 issues of gestetner production.

In February, 1977 the Ontario Winter Games were held in North Bay. NOBA again finished 4th, with Cesar Battochio and Brenda Semeniuk picking up a bronze medal in mixed doubles. The other team members were Richard Chartrand, Alanna Larocque, Pete Tiller, Paul Maynard, Pierrette Hebner and Lois Urwin.

The 1977 Northern was something special because it had by then been discovered that the first Northern was held in 1927 and this was, therefore, the 50th anniversary of its founding. Research into the history of The Northern had been begun in conjunction with *The Northern Shuttle*, research that would lead five years later to the publication of this book.

NOBA enjoyed another successful season in 77-78. Three new invitational tournaments - the Kap Open, Porcupine Open and Soo Open - thrived along with the established ones. The Ontario Under 19 Championships were hosted in Sudbury. The Northern Shuttle's circulation grew to 1,200 as the number of registered NOBA players was almost ten times greater than it had ever been before. And New Liskeard's Don MacKenzie had developed in Kirkland Lake the largest junior summer camp in Canada, serving over 60 players during a two-week period each August.

Northern No. 47, in 1978, was held in Sudbury and saw the welcome return of Creighton Mine's Elio Cozzarini. Elio won his first Northern singles title and teamed up with clubmate Nevio Cristante for his second doubles.

Alanna Larocque of Garson and Anne Cormier of Creighton Mine were both double winners also, as they repeated their 1977 wins in women's singles and doubles while Anne captured the mixed doubles with Sudbury's Paul Maynard. Joe Kowal of Sudbury was a finalist in three events.

The 78-79 season saw a major change for The Northern Shuttle as it was incorporated into an expanded publication called Ontario Badminton. The new tabloid was still produced in the north and still edited by Bev Green and Rosemary Moore, but distribution and finances were now handled by OBA. For northerners, the extremely personal touch of their own paper and a 12-times-per-year circulation were traded for increased knowledge and awareness of activities throughout the province, a decreased financial burden, and 6-times-per-year circulation.

Also that year, the Ontario Under 16 Championships were hosted in North Bay, Paul Maynard was a double-winner at the Ontario Intermediate Championships, Alanna Larocque played on Ontario's silver medal Canada Games team, and all other programs continued to hum along. At the 4th, Ontario Winter Games in Kingston, the NOBA team won two silver and two bronze medals and the overall bronze medal in team standings. The players were: Elio Cozzarini, Paul Maynard, Joe Kowal, Dan Udeschini, Anne Cormier, Brenda Coates, Alanna Larocque and Kim Sajatovic.

The 1979 Northern was held in a beautiful 12-court facility at White Pines Collegiate in Sault Ste Marie and enjoyed a large entry from throughout the district. A special feature of the finals was the attendance of

Harold Tolley and Anne Carter, along with Harold Crowder, all of whom had been stars of The Northern's early years.

Alanna Larocque of Garson won her third straight singles crown and fourth successive doubles, this time with Sue Carbone of Creighton Mine. Dan Udeschini of Elliot Lake won the men's singles and Paul Maynard took his second Northern title by winning the men's doubles with Mark Tremblay. Mark was a junior player from Bracebridge who had been playing with the Creighton Mine club for two seasons.

For the first time, Alanna Larocque was playing in three finals but her chance for a triple disappeared as she and Peter Tiller of Capreol lost to the 1975 champions Bud and Pierrette Hebner, now playing out of Sault Ste Marie.

During the 79-80 season, another major change took place in the area of communication. The Canadian badminton journal, Badminton Review, which had been started in 1964 and discontinued in 1976, was reborn under the editorship of Bev Green and Rosemary Moore. Ontario Badminton continued as before but now had the capability of focusing more on provincial events, since national and international news was reported in the CBA publication.

The Ontarjo Seniors & Masters Championship was hosted in Sudbury and two district championships were expanded. The NOBA Junior added an under-14 division to the under-16 and under-19 that had previously been held, and masters events were added to the now NOBA Seniors & Masters tournament.

At the 1980 Northern, held in Sudbury, most people were looking ahead to 1981 as the host committee in Sault Ste Marie had already begun preparations for the Golden Northern the following year.

Alanna Larocque put herself in a position to shatter the record book in 1981 by winning the singles and

In what must surely be one of the most remarkable records in any sporting event anywhere, Elio and Brenda's wins marked the 19th consecutive year in which the Creighton Mine Badminton Club has won at least one Northern title. In 26 out of the last 28 years, at least one of the champions at each Northern has been from Creighton Mine.

Bill Yeates and Bud Hebner of Sault Ste Marie won the men's doubles, a first for Bill but Bud's 4th Northern title.

An interesting trend was emerging at The Northern with the wins, in 1979 and 1980, by Dan Udeschini, Bill Yeates and Brenda Frey. They all had in common the fact that they had started their badminton careers in high school programs: Dan in Elliot Lake with coach Jim Muchmore, Bill in New Liskeard with coach Tom Buck, and Brenda in North Bay's Widdifield SS.

The single most remarkable feature of badminton development in the north during the 70s was the growth of the game in the schools and the greater number of coaches fostering junior programs in conjunction with the schools. It was most satisfying to see the graduates of those programs taking their places among the champions of The Northern.

The start of the 80-81 season saw the 50th issue of The Northern Shuttle roll off the presses as Ontario Badminton headed into its third year and Badminton Review started its second season under northern stewardship. Prior to the 50th Northern taking place in Sault Ste Marie, the Ontario "B" Championships will be held in Sudbury in a beautiful new 6-court facility at Cambrian College. It will be the fifth consecutive year in which NOBA has hosted a provincial tournament.
